I developed and led the Childrens' ministry team at St John's for 16 years and am now building relationships with and supporting the many asylum seekers and refugees who are part of our church family. I am also part of our PCC and Deanery Synod.

With such a varied background I have insight into many of the issues currently affecting society which the church is called to speak into. From health and education to housing, inner city challenges, poverty and immigration, I bring life experience and the awareness of many perspectives.

Over the decades I have experienced the love and kindness of God; His grace and His mercy have touched me and changed me. My prayer is that others also encounter God's love and that the local church is a place where this is expressed and experienced. However, we all know that there are areas of the Church of England where the reality and the ideal don't match up and I'm pleased to see that General Synod is having significant discussions about some of these key areas including safeguarding, clergy discipline and the reorganization of national church institutions, in order to address them. I feel that the breadth of wisdom and understanding I have gained throughout my life gives me insight to inform my contribution to these debates, should I be elected.
