A place is here for you.



St. John's ~ A Good Year of Ministry, Mission, Teaching and Prayer

Since moving into Interregnum in the Summer of 2023, whilst praying earnestly for an inspirational new Leader, the people of St. John's Church Family have stepped up even further, to ensure A Good Year of opportunities for Ministry, Mission and Growth.

Having celebrated in fellowship and thanksgiving, a wonderful Season of Harvest with schools, uniformed organisations and the Community, our plans came to fruition around the theme of Remembrance, including a Memorial Service for those recently bereaved and those wishing to remember loved ones. Remembrance Sunday, always a large scale and moving time of respect and reflection in the Village, brought together members of the community, at St. John's, in the Park and at The Avenue Nursing Home.

Advent and Christmas, together with the usual festivities, presented many opportunities for community engagement, including, Messy Church, a 'Blue Christmas', a Candle-lit Service of Lessons and Carols with St. John's Community Choir, a Christmas Eve Nativity Service, Midnight Communion and a Christmas Day Church Family Service.

Epiphany this year presented the opportunity to continue our celebrations of our Saviour's birth, with a beautiful Christingle service, drawing in uniformed organisations, schools, and the wider community. A quiet service of reflection opened our Parish Vision Day, leading us into a period of renewed commitment to our mission, values, action plans and goals.

Voluntary partners in the community, as varied as the Women's Institute and a local Folk Band, helped us to deliver another successful Innchurches Winter Shelter at St. John's, ensuring a warm, welcoming safe space for some of the most vulnerable in society.

Leading us into our Lent course, St. John's offered both church family and the community the opportunity for fellowship and cakes on a Sunday afternoon to watch together the second series of 'The Chosen', this will be followed by a Bible course later in the year with plans for an Alpha course in the Autumn.

Mothering Sunday in Clayton has always been special, with traditions such as The Mothers Union preparing and offering posies and the opportunity to encourage family members back to their 'Home' church. Being 'intentionally invitational', is an approach we are seeking to apply to all opportunities for mission and ministry throughout the year.

St. John's will again run the national initiative ~ Thy Kingdom Come. 'Light up the World in Prayer', and will offer a broad range of opportunities for participation, culminating in a citywide Pentecost praise in City Park, Bradford.

We are blessed to have those in our midst, people with a breadth of experience of leading different styles of worship, fellowship and teaching, with new approaches constantly being explored, including the introduction of a quiet Sunday Evening Service ~ 'Be Still'. We've also recently established a New Worshipping Community at The Avenue Nursing Home, bringing together residents, their families and carers, with Services and activities led by laity and clergy.

We hope you enjoyed the video at https://youtu.be/L1St_30IQ30 prepared by our Mission Apprentice, There are a wonderful range of active groups and initiatives, in the main led by laity and much valued volunteers at St John's. Here are a few more;

St. John's Messy Church

Messy Church started in November 2021. We love Messy Church and we run a 2 hour session every 4 - 6 weeks. We engage with a number of families from the community attracting 40 to 50 children and adults who have lots of fun, do crafts and share a meal and a short service giving a chance to learn about Jesus, all in a family friendly atmosphere. The church has a dedicated team of 12 to 15 volunteers committed to planning and running each session.

St. John's Art Group

The art group is a well established church group that meets every Thursday in the Community Rooms. The benefits to health and wellbeing through art are well known. The group displays their work at events throughout the year. The group is self sufficient and in the main are parishoners.

St. John's Lunch Club

The Lunch Club has been running for more than 7 years, serving a 3 course lunch to the over 60's. The club has over 40 members who dine weekly and chat over tea and biscuits. There is a weekly quiz and a raffle. The Club is supported by Bradford Community Transport Access Bus that collects and drops off many of the members. It is run by a team of 22 volunteers who cook and serve fortnightly. The kitchen has 5 star accreditation for food hygiene.

St. John's Mothers Union

Clayton Mothers Union is a small group who meet fortnightly, to enjoy fellowship, listen to guest speakers and support the Christian aims of the Worldwide Mothers Union.

St. John's Community Choir

Our Musical Director leads this choir of 30 or more singers every Thursday evening. The choir is for all-comers, very popular and provides a safe, secure outlet for people of any ability to a sing a popular repertoire. The choir perform at church, school and village events, and augment the congregation at Carols by Candlelight and other church services. Musical evenings with the School Choirs and Community Choir are very popular.

St. John's A Warm Welcome

This initiative started out as 'Warm Spaces' during the recent energy crisis, it was due to end in March 2023. Due to demand and the impact it is having within in the community it has been extended to become a permanent 'Warm Welcome'. It has a dedicated team of volunteers and a weekly attendance of up to 35 people.

St. John's Discipleship Groups

Currently four weekly groups run at various days and times during the week. Bible Study, Prayer and fellowship being the impetus for each group.

St. John's Everyday Faith

Each day a Bible Verse with a Thought for the Day is sent out via WhatsApp, e-mail and SMS message to church family and beyond. This is a real source of encouragement and fellowship with opportunities to spread the good news of Jesus.

St John's Toddler Group

This weekly group was adopted by the church post Covid as it was in fear of closing. We see this as a way of encouraging families into church. The group is supported by the Reader and Mission Apprentice.

St. John's Walking For Health

St John's Walking Group offers two levels of walks, from easy walks for all abilities and all ages to more strenuous walks for more experienced walkers. The walks are popular, good fun and also great fellowship.

The vicar will be supported by a Operations Administrator who takes bookings for weddings, funerals and baptisms, prepares weekly notice sheets, updates and responds to the church social media channels and website and maintains rotas. To aid this post the churches across Clayton, Fairweather Green and Allerton use Church Suite, Easy Worship and Data Developments software, all underpinned by Microsoft Teams and administered by the Operations Administrator.

This 22 hours a week post is part funded by the SDF Resourcing Churches fund. This post is instrumental in creating and sharing resources and know how across the partner churches. This has shown itself in many shared initiatives and systems to 'work smarter', freeing up time for clergy to focus on renewal and revitalisation.

Volunteers

The church is blessed with a large group of active and dedicated volunteers who run most of the events in church and for the community. This may be preparing lunches, preparing worship, teas and coffees, worship music, winding the clock, welcoming, intersessions, readings, running youth groups, Messy Church, leading a discipleship group, worshiping at our Avenue plant, or running the sound, lighting and computer desk during events in the church and in the community rooms.

Clayton

Clayton - Your Home

The village has Victoria Park at its centre. The park has a childrens play area, multiuse football and basketball court, a bowling green, picnic area and seating. Its a pleasant place to walk and to sit. The parks focal point is the War Memorial, where the village gather for their Annual Remembrance Service.

Surrounding the park are shops and houses, a Post Office, a Newsagents and a Family Butchers. The village has the usual range of Take-aways, Hair Salons and Barbers. There is a local Vet, Physiotherapist and Chiropodist. Larger businesses include Sherbourne Furniture and Thermo-Cable.

The largest shop is a B&M. The Quora retail park, about a mile away at Paradise Green, has an Aldi, Greggs, Starbucks, a pub / restaurant and other stores for the weekly shop. The Village has a wide range of pubs, clubs and sporting opportunities including the local cricket and golf club. There is vast open countryside and nearby Horton Bank Countryside Park and Ogden Water.

Clayton and its neighbours in Fairweather Green make up a council ward with a population of 16,982, taken from the 2016 census.

The village has four schools, three of which are state <u>primary</u> schools; Clayton St. John's Church of England Primary School, Clayton Village Primary School, and St. Anthony's Roman Catholic Primary School.

A day and boarding school for Muslim girls, Jaamiatul Imaam Muhammad Zakaria School, was established in the imposing former Union Workhouse buildings at Thornton View.

The village has several Christian places of worship representing different denominations as well as an active 'Churches Together' committee and joint events at Easter and Remembrance.

Clayton - Your House

The vicarage was built in the 1960's on the site of the original Victorian vicarage. It is adjacent to the church, separated by a footpath. The four bedroomed family home is well maintained and offers modern accommodation. The house sits amid large gardens fronting Clayton Lane with a garage and plenty of parking space. The house benefits from a large, private rear gardens laid to lawn and borders. The house has a large study/ reception and visitors facilities that are accessed via an inner hallway providing an option of privacy from the rest of the accommodation.

We'd like to introduce the other two churches, where we are committed to provide both practical and pastoral support to in our capacity as a resourcing church. The churches are currently led by Reverend Philippa Slingsby-Lunn who is the Interim Associate Minister, supported by Daniel, our Curate and Pam, our Associate Priest. There is also support from our neighbours, St. James, Thornton and their vicar Revd Harry Gwinett.

It is anticipated that once the way forward for these two churches has been determined that the Interim Priest-in-Charge role attached to this post, will no longer be appropriate for the Vicar of St. John's Clayton to manage.

St Saviour's Fairweather Green

St Saviours Fairweather Green is part of the Outer Bradford Deanery. The church is in a residential area of Fairweather Green, a relatively small parish in size compared to other local parishes. Bordered by busy roads – Thornton Road and Allerton Road, with the Lower Grange Estate in the west of the parish, and Clayton Beck valley to the south.







St Peter's, Allerton

St Peters and St Francis Allerton is part of the Outer Bradford Deanery. St Peters Church on Allerton Road is our main centre for worship, whilst St Francis Hall on the Allerton Estate is used by community groups, charities and for church events.

Bishop's Statement for the post of Vicar of Clayton & Interim Priest-in-Charge of Allerton & Fairweather Green

Our vision in the Diocese of Leeds is about confident clergy equipping confident Christians to live and tell the good news of Jesus Christ. In appointing to every post, we seek people who have a joyful and confident faith which has inspired a track record of church growth, both numerically and spiritually.

St John's Clayton is a single church parish within a clearly defined large urban village in West Bradford. It has a growing population through new housing developments. St John's has strong lay leadership and associated structures. It was designated a Resourcing Church in 2019 and is receiving Strategic Development Funding from 2019-2027 to support revitalisation work in west Bradford. This funding is providing Operations Management support to the Resourcing Churches, and a series of 2-year part-time Mission Apprentices to develop areas of mission and ministry. In return, the Resourcing Churches committed to share resources generously with neighbouring parishes and to send people graciously to help revitalise and plant churches. For St John's, this originally meant outreach to the Thornaby estate within the parish but the focus shifted in 2021 so that the current main commitment is offering support to the nearby parishes of St Peter's Allerton and St Saviour's Fairweather Green as part of an Interim Ministry scheme.

St John's church is well-maintained, with excellent and well-used community rooms, and a recently reordered chancel area, which gives more flexibility for leading worship. There is a very good relationship with the Clayton St John's C of E Primary School and a growing relationship with Clayton Village School. However, the congregation is still recovering from the impacts of the pandemic, which saw a loss of children and families from the church (although a good number are engaged through Messy Church), as well as reduced income. A key challenge for the incoming vicar will be to continue the rebuilding of the "home" congregations, especially with children, young people and families, and to re-engage St John's more fully with its role and agreed goals as a Resourcing Church.

From the perspective of the Episcopal area we see three particular priorities for the new vicar, which apply at Clayton particularly, but also at Allerton and Fairweather Green:

- a) To sustain and develop a 'mixed ecology' of effective forms of mission, ministry and styles of worship to grow a wider diversity of ages in the church, and especially with families, young people and children. This must include reaching out to those moving into the new housing developments in the area.
- b) To continue building up confident lay ministry, both in depth and numbers. This will include developing pathways for evangelism and discipleship, encouraging new people into leadership and inhabiting a role as a strategic leader of leaders in a way which enables others to flourish. Hence, the incoming vicar will need excellent teaching, pastoral, communication, team building and team leadership skills.
- c) To creatively develop and strengthen active and visible relationships in the parishes, especially in Clayton, both personally as an individual and also through the congregations. (S)he should be able to engage strategically with the life of the communities, fostering excellent relationships (for example) with the local schools, uniformed organisations, other churches and community organisations. I expect her/him to contribute with others to a shared vision for Clayton in particular, and West Bradford more widely.

Alongside leading St John's as a Resourcing Church, the role currently includes being Interim Priest-in-Charge of St Peter's Allerton and St Saviour's Fairweather Green. St Peter's Allerton experienced a long ministry of 21 years with the previous incumbent. Sadly, congregation numbers became small, as was also the case at St Saviour's Fairweather Green. There were also significant shortfalls in contributions from both PCCs towards the cost of ministry provided by the Diocese. Both parishes became vacant on the retirement of their vicars in mid-2021. There were important and difficult questions to address as to whether there is the potential for adequate congregational and financial strength for both St Peter's and St Saviour's to be able to continue as standalone parishes, if that is the best future, what potential there is for growth, and what is the best way to realise it. Six specific objectives were therefore agreed for the Interim Ministry in the parishes of Allerton and Fairweather Green as part of revitalising parish ministry and mission there.

- 1. To grow a "team" from the existing congregations, those "graciously sent" from Resource, Resourcing and / or other neighbouring parishes, and other locally-based Christians, which can offer sustainable worship, mission and ministry in the parish;
- 2. To re-engage with the local community and community organisations in Fairweather Green and Allerton so that St Saviour's, St Peter's and St Francis are "open for business";
- 3. To establish whether viable congregation(s) can be grown;
- 4. To establish whether the parishes' finances can be rebuilt to a viable level;
- 5. To develop and agree proposals for future pastoral organisation (eg the two parishes with the neighbouring parish of Thornton);
- 6. To strengthen relationships with the churches of the rest of the Outer Bradford Deanery, as well as the Episcopal Area and Diocese.

To support the realisation of these objectives, as well as the Vicar of Clayton becoming the Interim Priest in Charge, an Interim Associate Minister was recruited. Progress was hindered by a number of factors, not least the pandemic. However, the objectives remain, and the work is now being led by the Interim Associate Minister. In July 2023, a training curate was appointed to work across the parishes and the neighbouring parish of St James Thornton also provided support, with their vicar being licensed to work in the parishes.

In common with all our Interim Ministry appointments, a monitoring process is in place for the work in Allerton and Fairweather Green, involving a quarterly meeting with the Archdeacon. Good progress is now being made, and the PCCs and congregations of both parishes are engaging well with plans for their future. A review will take place shortly to consider the next steps when the current period of Interim Ministry ends in July 2024. This will enable a decision to be taken as to whether the arrangements should be extended, made permanent or the appointment reviewed and changed. The criteria for the review will be based on the interim objectives agreed for the Interim Ministry.

The Deanery of Outer Bradford is comprised of parishes similar to Clayton, Allerton and Fairweather Green, many of whom are experimenting with mixing new approaches to worship and mission alongside inherited patterns. The new Vicar will therefore find a group of creative and supportive colleagues in the Deanery chapter, all of whom will be deeply familiar with the joys and challenges that each other faces. Hence, the new post holder will be expected to work with a spirit of generosity in sharing wisdom and insights about ministry within the Deanery of Outer Bradford and across the Episcopal Area.

Bradford - A Surprising City





- Bradford is UK's 5th largest Metropolitan District.
- 25% of the population is under 18 making Bradford the youngest City in the UK.
- You can travel to Leeds in 20 mins, Manchester in an hour and you are 3 hours away from London by train.
- Bradford is a multicultural city with a diverse population of which it is proud.
- Fountains is a new and vibrant city centre church.
- Bradford was awarded UK City of Culture 2025 status.

Bradford is one of the original 6 towns of Yorkshire that form a spiral to the east of the Pennines. These towns expanded dramatically in the 1850's when the district was central to the growth of the textile trades in the UK. Bradford grew to be the centre of the worlds woollen industries and was said to be richer than Berlin in the 1900's. Bradford is now a Metropolitan district including towns such as Bingley, Shipley, and Ilkley and villages such as Haworth, Clayton, Thornton, Oxenhope and Queensbury.

Bradford has always been a diverse and welcoming city and has seen many cultures making Bradford their home, settling and working originally in the woolen mills and nowadays in engineering, chemicals, automotive and food sectors alongside financial services and digital technologies. Unsurprisingly, Bradford is a City of Refuge.

The growth influenced much of the architecture, with areas such as Little Germany named after the merchants in the warehouse district and philanthropists such as Titus Salt who built a model workers village at Saltaire, now a World Heritage site.

The mill chimneys have all but gone and many entrepreneurs such as Urban Splash have rejuvenated the large mills into apartments and workshops to create space for the next generation.

It is also a tourist destination, with Saltaire and Haworth popular with visitors, Bradford is the first UNESCO City of Film and houses the National Science and Media Museum, a splendid City Park, the Alhambra Theatre, Cartwright Hall and Bradford Live! set to open in 2024.

This wealth of architectural heritage, its resilient people and its unique look at life contributed greatly to Bradford being awarded the City of Culture 2025.

The Diocese of Leeds

The Diocese of Leeds was formed at Easter 2014. It is one of the largest dioceses in the country covering an area of around 2425 square miles and a population of around 2,642,400 people. The diocese comprises five Episcopal areas, each served by a suffragan Bishop. Each Episcopal Area is coterminous with an Archdeaconry.
