Abstract: Monks contemplate. Philosophers contemplate. But do scientists contemplate? And should scientists contemplate? This seminar introduces and motivates three core questions underlying the new [Faraday Institute Research Hub on 'Science as a Contemplative Activity'](#) launched in April 2025. First, why should science return to its contemplative roots today? Second, how did early Christians situate the study of nature within their account of human spiritual progress? Third, what might it look like to contemplate in a contemporary scientific context? I will illustrate how our Research Hub in addressing these questions will bring together theological and philosophical accounts of modernity, early Christian reflections on spiritual progress, and contemporary sociological study of natural scientists, to develop a renewed understanding of science as a contemplative activity.

21st Century Archaeological research and Early Christianity

Abstract: After more than a century and a half of largely unscientific 'Biblical Archaeology', in the last two decades, mainstream scientific archaeological research has been transforming our understanding of the earliest Christians in the Holy Land. This lecture will outline some of these exciting twenty-first-century discoveries, shedding new light on Nazareth and its surroundings, urban settlement around the Sea of Galilee, the earliest churches, and re-dating the origins of Christian pilgrimage. The implications of each of these for understanding the early Christian world, and even – at Nazareth and on the shores of the Sea of Galilee – for the interpretation of the Gospels themselves, go far beyond the topographical identifications of earlier archaeologists working in this region, offering new insights into both the New Testament narrative and pre-Constantinian Christian life in this region.

Safeguarding in Charismatic Christian Worship Culture

Overview: Many people value charismatic worship as a place where they encounter God in a transformative and deeply meaningful way. But we have also become aware of a repeated pattern of abusive behaviours being facilitated in these spaces. I'll be talking about my research so far which is evaluating the worship culture in four London charismatic evangelical C of E churches using Justin Humphreys and Lisa Oakley's safeguarding evaluation framework. The analysis so far is based on live streamed services augmented by visits to the churches themselves and suggests that a) charismatic worship culture has a tendency to facilitate a very unhealthy safeguarding culture BUT b) some churches are demonstrating ways of doing it better.

I'm keen to learn from this ecological movement, partly because so much of my faith has been grown by enjoying wilder spaces, but also because I think we might find that God's wild Spirit works in surprising and re-energising ways among us as we ease back from control and learn unforced rhythms of grace.

Clergy Transitions Service

The Clergy Transitions Service (CTS) **provides confidential, personal support for Clergy who are at a vocational crossroad, or who are looking for a fresh opportunity.**

The CTS caters for all backgrounds and traditions in the Church of England – from Clergy currently in parochial posts, sector ministry, new forms of church and mission agencies, as well as ordained people currently employed or engaged in contexts other than the church. It is open to those currently serving in self-supporting posts, who are seeking a stipendiary role.

As well as practical help with developing a personal profile, job applications, and interview skills, the Service can work with individuals to develop a deeper understanding of their strengths and talents. By encouraging participants to develop greater self-awareness, reflect on personal values and think prayerfully about context and culture CTS can support the process of transition.

The CTS opens access to a wide range of resources to support a lifelong, fulfilling service to the Church, including access to a network of practitioners inside and outside the Church.

There is a cost of £400 plus VAT for an individual to use the Clergy Transitions Service for up to a year. If you wish to access this service you will either need to pay for this yourself, or apply to the Director of Ministry Formation (Steve Proudlove) or your area Clergy Development Officer to use your CMD grant. The CDO you contact will treat your accessing the service as completely confidential – but cannot authorize your use of your CMD pot to pay for this unless he/she knows who you are.

If you want to proceed further after your initial meeting:

- Contact your CDO to say that you wish to use your CMD grant to pay for this.
- Once your CDO approves the use of your CMD pot to fund this service, pay the invoice directly and then claim a refund using the standard CMD Claim form.
- If you do not have sufficient funds in your CMD pot, you will have to pay the extra.
