# II. Parish/Community Information

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1(a)	Briefly describe the population mix of the(se) parish(es) in terms of its employment, cultural, ethnic, age and housing mix.	Employment is around average, but lower for the young. Bingley, Gilstead, and Cottingley are not yet hugely diverse in terms of heritage. All three places are around 90% white, but this is changing slowly. Most houses are owned but around 20-25% proportion rented out by private landlords or the council. There are slightly more retired people than average, and slightly fewer working age adults.
(b)	Are there any special social problems (eg high unemployment)?	The parish of Holy Trinity is in the most deprived quarter of parishes nationwide. This brings issues around food access, heating and other social problems. Research by the Community Centre suggests that Cottingley has a problem with heavy drinking.

• Local Businesses:	Bingley is a thriving town with many local businesses. The Arts Centre is in the centre of town. It is surrounded by shops and cafes. There are non-retail businesses in Bingley too, providing some local employment. Damart in Bingley is the most obvious local business, their building is visible when arriving in, or driving through, town. Bingley seems to have a decent local economy; the high street is very often busy. Cottingley and Gilstead are smaller places and the people who live there tend to engage in business elsewhere.

Describe any civic responsibilities which the clergy have:	This is under review as civic responsibilities in Bingley itself have changed along with the changes of clergy through the years. Remembrance Day is important in both Cottingley and Gilstead. The civic responsibilities are relatively light here.

(b)	Describe the mix of the congregation in terms of age, employment, cultural, ethnicity, age and gender.	Our churches are currently mostly white, retired or employed people. Our age range is primarily 50 upwards, but we have some younger families both settled and making connections, so we hope to extend our range. Holy Trinity is, on average, an older congregation than St Wilfrid and St Michael, but there have been younger people joining us for worship recently.
2(a)	How would you describe the churchmanship tradition of each church and give details of robes and vestments worn by officiants?	Holy Trinity is unfussy catholic. Chasuble worn. Hymns with organ. Sung responsorial psalm.

		St Wilfrid is broadly Anglican. Chasuble worn. Hymns with organ. All Age Worship one Sunday each month. St Michael is broadly Anglican too, with more modern music played by a small and still- developing band. Chasubles are worn here, but not by every priest who celebrates.

# IV. Outreach and Mission

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1(a)	What are the regular mission and outreach activities of the parish?	HT&SW: We have two weekly open sessions where those who are lonely or may need some company can come and chat. We have soups and biscuits on offer as well as tea and coffee. We are also involved in the running of the Bingley Community Kitchen. The clergy are involved with Trinity All Saints Primary School, next door. Pub Church runs every other week in a pub room in Bingley. Anyone is welcome to come and discuss faith.
		SM: We have a weekly open place for tea and toast which has been a wonderful social event for local retired people, and people have been brought into church through this. Each month there is a Songs of Praise event for people to come and sing hymns. Many of the events on at St Michael's have been in the day time and we are expanding our offer to meet the needs of people who work during the day. Our toddler groups is about to be up and running again after a short break. There are plans for a more seeker-friendly service at St Michael's. Informal, discussion and worship based, involving scripture and theological investigation in a very low-key way in for anyone who may be curious but not want to commit to Sunday mornings. Many of the members of St Michael's volunteer in various capacities at Cottingley Community Centre. This is their vocation and helps make us visible in the community. We are in conversation about expanding youth provision. The incumbent currently runs a Community Choir that's not remotely church related but is to serve the needs – mental wellbeing, physical wellbeing – of the local community.
(b)	What are you doing to help people find out about Jesus?	As above. We have plenty planned and we regularly invite people to come and see. We make ourselves visible and available in the community, at events and simply being around. However, we would like to focus on this more closely now things have settled. St Michael's had a very long vacancy before the current priest was appointed. All the parishes are now in a position where they are keen to see growth.

(c)	What are you doing to help grow people in discipleship?	There have been courses available recently, which were well-attended and appreciated. More are planned for the future. As above, we hope to extend our services as churches to include those who have questions and would like to think about things in a more informal setting. Prayer is encouraged. There are many services during the week that people may attend if they choose to.
(d)	What are you doing to grow people in leadership?	We have members attending the diocesan course on Personal Growth. We encourage lay leadership of events and new initiatives – for example, the children's initiatives at St Michael's are led by lay people. We support people to consider their vocation, and work with those feeling a call to serve in a more official capacity within the Church.

A family recently joined from overseas and the Reader at St Michael's, who is a teacher specialising in such things by profession, offered ESL lessons before the child started school. We feel that we can offer bespoke support because of the size of our churches.

6.	What part does the church play in community care?	We care for our community through support of local families, food banks etc. As detailed above. Many members volunteer in some capacity to provide services for the local community. We would like our new priest to be a person who enjoys being out in, and building links with, the local community. This is a priority for us as churches. Bingley Community Kitchen is supported and run by volunteers from HT&SW.
