Bishop's Update

From Desert to Garden

The TV is full of desert images – of hostile environments with blinding sandstorms, stifling heat, lack of water and danger. It's where thousands are living without the taken-for-granted necessities of clean water, electricity and public health services. We too may be going through the desert as the cost of living impacts our lives; and it's in this desert we confront our innermost fears and anxieties.

Lent helps us consider Jesus' desert experience which became for him a place of discovery: finding out what he couldn't do by himself but what he could do by trusting God. Jesus' temptations (and ours) are for popularity; compromising integrity and greed. In other words, for a quick fix, a short cut and instant results!

However, Jesus' choice was to stand alongside those who are weak and vulnerable. A choice which led to a harsh trial and unbelievable suffering. God is ceaselessly at work making something better out of the mess we make of things and drawing good even when things are badly wrong. God invites us to share in this work, so I pray that God's Spirit gives to those who are suffering – relief; to those who lead – wisdom; to those who serve – courage and compassion; to those who die – eternal rest; to those who are mourning – comfort; to those who are going through the desert – the seeds of peace.

This desert leads us to a garden where Mary Magdalene bumps into a man she thinks is the gardener. Jesus is the gardener of the new creation. The old garden had become overgrown with thickets of obscure religious practices, weeds of injustice and great brambles of despair. What happened on that first Easter morning was that the world was given a whole new start. That's why the resurrection is still such an explosive force in today's world.Every part of human existence is affected by this new creation. The world of politics, arts, science, technology, economics, the legal system – just about everything is up for resurrection.

May you, like Mary recognise Jesus amid life's debris. May you see transformation in all that's messy, and experience the joys of Easter, and for when it comes: Alleluia!Christ is risen. He is risen indeed. Alleluia!

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Archdeacon's Update

Recently, I have been reading more than usual; I decided that for Lent, at those times when I would normally have watched some TV, I would read instead. I have tried to focus my reading on books that speak into the theme of the Lenten journey; a couple of actual Lent Books (including the Archbishop of Canterbury's Lent Book for 2024, Tarry Awhile by Selina Stone, which is very good). I've also read a couple of books that come from the Taizé Community in France – both by Brother John of Taizé: The Wrath of a Loving God, and Life on the Edge, which are also excellent.

The blessing of taking this time to do something different to normal routine is that it provides an opportunity to think and reflect on both the patterns of life that I've fallen into, but also to think and reflect on what I'm actually reading. Spending time with an author's thoughts and perspectives on the journey of discipleship, on what it means for us to be God's family together, on how the great themes of our faith inform and guide our daily lives in the down to earth practicalities of living, is a blessing because it opens up a prayerful contemplation of how God might be calling us. Sometimes it becomes clear that it's a call back onto the path from which we've begun to stray; sometimes it's a call onwards as we develop in our pilgrimage; sometimes it's a call to do or to pray through specific things, whether challenges or opportunities, situations or relationships, people or places.

Engaging with the thoughts and ideas of a variety of authors is also reminding me of the value, the necessity, or our ongoing and shared conversation as God's family in this place. As I go around the Archdeaconry and Diocese, I'm encouraged, enthused, challenged and uplifted by the encounters I have with people and groups, communities and congregations, and by the things we discuss and do together. This embodies for me something important of what it means for us to be the church, the family of God, in our parishes, deaneries, episcopal areas, diocese, and wider.

What Lent is reminding me of, more than anything else, is the precious gift in God that we are to each other, in all our diversity and difference, and what a blessing we are to one another in the pilgrimage that we share.

May God bless you in this journey, and prepare you for the great feast of Easter.

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PCC Treasurers: important information

We are aware that some parishes find it difficult to recruit a PCC Treasurer, and the finance and stewardship teams in Leeds are ready to offer suggestions and support where they can. Where there is no treasurer, it falls to the Churchwardens to ensure that the PCC's funds are being managed and administered appropriately, and they can either do this themselves, or more usually, find someone who can do it under their oversight.

What is never appropriate is for the clergy holding office in the parish to act as treasurer; this introduces conflicts of interest and function. We are aware that in some places clergy have been fulfilling the role of treasurer, but we must ask that this does not continue; instead, we would ask that the Churchwardens and PCC consider alternative arrangements, reaching out to the diocesan team for advice if necessary.

Everyone agreed that they were really pleased that they have made the effort to attend on such an awful night. It was a worthwhile opportunity for choristers from small church choirs to sing and socialise with those from larger groups. Christ Church, New Mill introduced a local Christmas project to share the story of The Nativity locally. This was a new event in the life of the Village and was as much about bringing Good News as it was about encouraging our community to join in with the Christmas story and be part of it.

The church reached out into the community and three lantern making workshops were arranged prior to the main event. All materials were supplied at the workshops from a local grant provided by the Holme Valley Parish Council. Local folks, their children and various community groups joined together and made lanterns which were carried in the procession following the Star to the Church Community Garden where there was a Stable. The journey began at New Mill Club with Carols led by the church choir. The Angel Gabriel then announced to Mary that she was to have a child and he was to be called Jesus. On the wettest, rainiest and windiest evening the group set off the half mile up the road following the Star in a procession of light, with Mary, Joseph and the Donkey leading us. Once the villagers arrived there the story of the nativity was dramatised for the 80 or so people who joined in!

There was a warming fire in the pit, and the garden which was beautifully decorated. Refreshments mulled wine, cake and mince pies were served by the local co-op and community gardeners to the pilgrims.

This was true village get together, and a celebration that will certainly be repeated later this year. Rev Canon Sean Robertshaw commented, "After a year of bad news we wanted to provide a community focus which was accessible, affordable, and fun. Even in spite of the weather we achieved the goal!"

At Hepworth Every Christmas - Revd Keith Griffin

Every Christmas something rather magical takes place in Hepworth Church, in the Upper Holme Valley Team of churches near to Holmfirth. It started around twenty years ago with a couple of Christmas Tree Festivals. Someone then suggested holding a different sort of Christmas event. "What if the theme was The Twelve Days of Christmas and we see what kind of displays and exhibits everyone comes up with?"

It worked. Every September letters of invitation are sent out around the parish to among others, the Junior School, the Football Club, the Art Group, the Mothers' Union, the Pre-school, the Badminton Club, the Bell Ringers, the Methodist Church, and a few local artists. Each year there's a new theme. There has been Sounds Like Christmas, Light of The World, Christmas Around the World, Peace at Christmas, Follow the Star and, last year, Happy Family Christmas. The formula has hardly changed at all.

Come the second weekend of December every window sill, corner, altar, and flat surface in the church is full. You might spot a model which someone has clearly spent many hours working on. There's probably something knitted. An exhibit from the school may well have photos of the children included. Someone might offer a piece of abstract art, or a poem. Happy Family Christmas saw the Mothers' Union engaging with the subject of domestic violence.

The vast majority who participate would consider themselves absolute amateurs, and this is where the magic is to be found. Most would simply laugh at the idea of showing anything they have made anywhere else. And for the vast majority this will be the only time they visit church all year. What we witness is a glorious coming together of participants who first manage to find that little spark of courage to get involved. They then rise to the challenge of each successive theme, take the risk of trying something out, and share with everyone something... well, new. Wherever you see the joy and delight of people making stuff, taking risks, working together or alone, then surprising themselves by being able to sit back and declare, "I did that!" – well, you're standing on holy ground.

Like some of the best things in life, no one designed this event to be like this. Like other good things we know, words can only do a second-rate job in their attempt to describe something so precious and quirky, and yet which also draws and touches upon something quite profound within the human spirit. It's Christmas, the Incarnation, a true sign of God with us, and alive in this little, country parish. As Franciscan writer Ilia Delio says, "Where there is God, there is the invitation to create."

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<u>Holy Nativity Mixenden appoints project lead to launch 3 year project:</u> <u>Building Community Together</u>

Thanks to funding from the UK government through the UK Shared Prosperity Fund, Holy Nativity Mixenden and Illingworth are thrilled to announce the launch of an ambitious project that will transform Holy Nativity Church into a vibrant eco-friendly community hub over the next three years.

As a church which already offers a wide range of outreach activities and community support, Holy Nativity has been working closely with community partners in their area for years and has long aspired to be able to do more. Through their partners at Calderdale Council and North Halifax Partnership; they were invited to apply for funding for two posts, initially for one year, to begin to make their vision a reality. On 1 March, Jo Beacroft-Mitchell, a long standing member of the Holy Nativity community with a background in developing church based community projects took up her post as Fundraising, development and Community Engagement manager.

Jo says: "This project stems from a shared vision between church and community of creating a space where sustainability, community engagement, and Christian values intersect to uplift and empower everyone in the parish."

"Over the next three years, we have set some lofty aspirations that we believe will not only enhance our church but also enrich the lives of all who call the parish of Holy Nativity home."

"Our first goal is to see the development of the building into a flagship eco-church and community hub. This space will serve as a beacon of sustainability, providing a nurturing environment for all who enter its doors. Our building was created for and by the community and is celebrating 70 years as a church at the heart of the estate. The building is first and foremost a place to worship and glorify God, but more than that; we see it as a thriving community asset, bustling with life and activity, where people from all walks of life come together to connect, grow, and support one another."

"Alongside development of the building, our aim is to create a happy, well-run, and efficient volunteer hub, where individuals can experience the transformative power of Christian community in action through the activities we offer throughout the week."

Revd Robb Sutherland said: "Often the narrative for communities like ours is about scarcity and what we lack. We believe that God has a better story to tell of estates like ours and our ultimate desire is to foster a happy and fulfilled Christian community, that takes pride in what we can achieve together."

"Estates ministry is a joy and a privilege but brings with it challenges as well; with Jo's support we are looking to the next 70 years and the sustainability of our community, we're developing a comprehensive plan, working with the community to make sure the building is open 7 days a week and ensuring that the development of the building reflects our care and concern for the environment and is also efficient and easy to run for the next generation of worshippers."

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""As someone with long links to the National Estates Church Network and the Estates Ministry task force, my aspiration for this project is for Holy Nativity to capture the attention of the wider church, showing what communities like ours are capable of and inspiring others to think big."

The first stage of the project is to secure funding for feasibility studies and plans for the building and to appoint the second funded post: a caretaker, so that the building can be opened 7 days a week and the range of activities on offer every day can expand.

Revd Sutherland concluded: "I am so proud of what our church has achieved so far, it's wonderful to receive investment from the local and national government that recognises the place of the church at the heart of this community. This is just the beginning, and we are going to need even more support in the coming years, as we embark on this journey I'd love to invite our colleagues across the episcopal area to pray for us as we start the next stage of life with God at Holy Nativity."

The UK Shared Prosperity Fund is a central pillar of the UK government's Levelling Up agenda and provides £2.6 billion of funding for local investment by March 2025. The Fund aims to improve pride in place and increase life chances across the UK investing in communities and place, supporting local business, and people and skills. The Bishop's Development Fund

Supporting Mission in the Diocese of Leeds



The Bishop's Development Fund is a charity to help Anglican churches within the Huddersfield and Wakefield Episcopal areas of the Diocese of Leeds to develop new mission initiatives.

The Bishop's Development Fund seeks to fund projects which will enhance the mission of the church in the ollowing areas:-

- Congregation Growth projects which provide new facilities, or initiatives, to encourage more people to attend and support Church.
- · Attracting Young People new initiatives to attract and retain young people
- · Community Outreach new projects which bring benefits to the wider local community.

The aim of the fund is to support locally based projects where mission not maintenance is the keynote of Church life. The Trustees are looking for interesting and innovative applications which clearly demonstrate how they will enhance mission in the parish.

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Retired Clergy Officer Update

The first two months as Retired Clergy Officer

As I begin this role, I am very grateful for a series of conversations with Revd Christine Shedd and with meetings and conversations with each of the Area Deans. I have also had the opportunity to chat with Bishop Smitha in the light of these.

We have some 96 retired clergy and in addition some 34 clergy widow/widowers across the area. We are indebted and grateful for the continuing ministry of our retired clergy. I am also beginning to understand something of the challenges of stepping into retirement and of continuing to offer ministry in retirement. Another concern is how we as a diocese and in particular this episcopal area offer ongoing support as retired clergy age and face a range of challenges such as financial, health and bereavement.

The year began with the deaths and funerals of Revd John Radcliffe who I had got to know quite well and Revd Barbara Lydon who sadly I had not met. It was a privilege to attend these services and hear something of the work of God in their lives.

I. How do we offer pastoral care to retired clergy and their families. We have begun a new approach to try to ensure that access to ongoing support is available should people wish to receive this. Within each of our deaneries there will be a retired clergy officer from that deanery who will work with me. The role is not administrative but rather a link person to ensure that as far as is able no one is overlooked, and all retired clergy can receive pastoral support should they wish. Further information on who will be taking on these roles will be given in the near future.

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Retired Clergy Officer Update cont...

2. Another strand of support offered is through study days and other opportunities to meet together.

a. We are holding a study day for retired clergy from both the Huddersfield and Wakefield areas on 17th April at Christ the King Battyeford. Bishop Chris Edmundson has kindly agreed to come and speak.

b. Looking ahead with details to follow:

i. Bishop Smitha is hosting a cream tea for retired clergy widows/widowers in the summer

ii. There will be a second study day for retired clergy in September.

3. Keeping informed about the work of the National Retired Clergy Council particularly regarding pensions, housing and other matters that directly affect retired clergy. I am attending the next retirement officers meeting which takes place at Southwark Cathedral in Holy Week. I think this will be helpful particularly as Pensions Board will be at this event and am aware there are concerns from retired clergy but also from some still in full-time ministry.

Hope this gives a small insight into this area of ministry.

Share and Share Alike

If I asked most people what topic they least like to talk about, I bet the top answer would be... money! (Unless we're having a moan about how much things cost, etc!). For some reason, money is one of those subjects that's considered not polite to discuss.

But money, and how we use it, is one of the subjects Jesus talked about more than any other – so our Christian living would be somewhat lacking if we didn't pay attention to our 'financial discipleship', and how we put the resources that we have to good use for the kingdom of God. What choices do we make about what to buy, and from whom we buy it? What do we do about the needs around us? How do we support the work of the Christian family, the Church? All these are proper and pertinent questions to be asking ourselves as we think through what our response to God should look like.

We all know that we've been collectively going through some tough times over the past years; financial crises, credit crunches, pandemics, inflation, energy price rises, and so on have affected everyone, mostly negatively. We understand that, we all get it, because we're all living through it.

Part of the impact of this has been felt in what the church family in this diocese has coming in, and therefore what we can pay out. Looking at the figures for our Episcopal Area over the past few years, there has been a pretty consistent shortfall between what was requested in Parish Share each year, and what came in. The shortfall has been around £1million each year for several years.

Now, as I say, we all understand that times have been tough for all of us, not least financially – so there's no point in bashing ourselves over the head with these figures. They are what they are, and we can't change the past, only the future. But, as Bishop Nick often reminds us, we can only pay out what comes in! We don't have enormous reserves to draw upon.

Share and Share Alike cont....

Years ago, I remember as a boy hearing people on our PCC complaining that the parish share (we called it 'the quota' then) was all going to pay for the diocesan office. It wasn't really true, it was mostly paying for ministry in parishes, but the old grumble never went away. I thought I'd look at what the figures are for our diocese, and I was surprised. I found that for every £3 the diocese receives in Parish Share, we spend £4 on ministry in parishes. We can do that because of some national church funding that helps. But it means that NONE of the parish share is spent on central functions – all of it (plus quite a bit extra) goes back into parish ministry.

This does mean that when the contributions from parishes fall behind what is needed, there is only one area in which the diocese can seek to make savings, and that is in parish ministry. Big reductions have been made in the central team (which has an impact in parishes too), but the impact of reduced share receipts over multiple years can only be on the parish ministry budget, which means clergy posts. We are beginning to see that impact as we have to make tough decisions in vacancies.

I pray that, as time goes on, we will see a recovery in the economy, an easing of the cost of living crisis, an upturn in the amount we can collectively give to resource the work of God in and through our diocesan family, and that we will be in a position before too many years go by, where we are looking to increase the budget for parish ministry again. That will be possible when we are individually and collectively able to help reduce that gap between what's asked for in share, and what's coming in. Please join me in praying that we will be in that position soon.

Meanwhile, let's at least rejoice in the fact that for every £1 we contribute in parish share, the parishes collectively are receiving £1.33 back. That's not a bad rate of return to build from!

A Call for Foundation Governors in local schools

There is a desperate shortage of Foundation Governors in our local schools, and this comes as a plea to clergy and lay people to offer their time, energy and wisdom to help our children flourish.

What is my role as a 'Foundation' Governor?

Foundation governors are an important part of the wider team of governors. As such their main role is to work with other members of the governing body to fulfil all of the functions required of all school governors (see above), undertaking training as required. However, a foundation governor has a specific role. It is **not** the role of foundation governors to solely take on responsibility for the 'church school' aspects of governance, all governors are governors of a church school.

The role of the Foundation Governor is to ensure that the full governing body nurtures, encourages and challenges the school in living out its Christian foundation by:

- Developing the distinctive Christian vision and character of the school;
- Ensuring high-quality Collective Worship and Religious Education;
 Securing positive links between the school, the parish and the Diocesan Board of Education;
- Promoting Christian values in the way in which the governing body conducts its business;
- Ensuring that development as a church school is embedded in the school improvement plan and a regular part of the governing body self-evaluation;
- · Ensuring that points for development following Section 48 inspection are addressed;
- Being involved in the recruitment process for a new Head Teacher;
- · Reporting to the Parochial Church Council or the Diocesan Board of Education as appropriate.

'A strong, well-led governing body, supportive of the school, its teachers and its mission makes an important contribution to the school's wellbeing and effectiveness. The foundation governors will have an especial care for the school's Christian character.' (National Society 2013)
